













For the 1875 painting by Renoir with the same theme and location, see Lunch at the Restaurant Fournaise.

Luncheon of the Boating Party, 1881. Included in the Salon in 1882, it was identified as the best painting in the show by three critics. It was purchased from the artist by the dealer-patron Paul Durand-Ruel and bought in 1923 (for \$125,000) from his son by industrialist Duncan Phillips, who spent a decade in pursuit of the work. It is now in The Phillips Collection in Washington, D.C.

The painting depicts a group of Renoir's friends relaxing on a balcony at the Maison Fournaise restaurant along the Seine in Chatou, France. The diagonal of the railing serves to demarcate two halves of the composition, one densely packed with figures, the other all but empty, except for the proprietor's daughter Louise-Alphonsine Fournaise and her brother, Alphonse Fournaise, Jr, made prominent by the contrast. Both sport traditional straw boaters and appear to the left side, peripheral to the party. Alphonsine is the smiling woman leaning on the railing; Alphonse, who was responsible for the boat rental, is the leftmost figure.

Other Subjects depicted: (Identification of the sitters was made in 1912 by Julius Meier-Graefe.)

- Seamstress Aline Charigot, holding an affenpinscher dog, sits bottom left. She replaced an earlier woman with whom Renoir had become annoyed. Renoir married her in 1890, and they had three sons.
- Charles Ephrussi—wealthy amateur art historian, collector, and editor of the *Gazette des Beaux-Arts* appears wearing a top hat in the background. The younger man to the left of Ephrussi, more casually attired in a brown coat and cap, may be Jules Laforgue, his personal secretary, and a poet and critic.
- Actress Ellen Andrée drinks from a glass in the center. Seated across from her, in brown coat and hat, back turned is Baron Raoul Barbier, former mayor of colonial Saigon.
- Also wearing straw boaters are figures appearing to be Renoir's close friends Eugène Pierre Lestringez, a bureaucrat, and Paul Lhote, himself an artist. Renoir depicts them with the actress Jeanne Samary in the upper right-hand corner.
- Seated in the foreground, lower right, is painter and art patron, Gustave Caillebotte, wearing a white boater's shirt and flat-topped straw boater's hat as he sits backwards in his chair next to actress Angèle Legault and Italian journalist Adrien Maggiolo. An art patron, painter, and important figure in the impressionist circle, Caillebotte was also an avid boatman and drew on that subject for several works.





